Top Pet Toxins of 2013

In 2013, the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center (APCC) in Urbana, Illinois, handled nearly 180,000 cases about pets exposed to possibly poisonous substances. Topping the list for the sixth year in a row are prescription human medications. Nearly 20 percent of all calls were from owners whose pets got into medicines intended for human use.

Here are the top 10 toxins of 2013 ranked in order of call volume:

1. Prescription Human Medications

The APCC handled 24,673 cases regarding human prescription medications



in 2013. The top three types of medications that animals

were exposed to include: heart medications (blood pressure pills), antidepressants and pain medications (opioids and prescription non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs). Many of these exposures were due to people dropping their medication when preparing to take it, and before they knew it, Fido had gobbled the pill off the floor.

2. Insecticides

Insecticides are used in the yard, home and on our animals. While 15.7 percent of all calls to the APCC are about insecticides, more than half of the calls involving cats pertain to felines exposed to insecticides. Always read the label before using any insecticide on your pet, in your home or in your yard.

3. Over-the-Counter Human Medications

Over-the-counter human products accounted for 14.7 percent of calls to APCC in 2013.

This group contains acetaminophen, ibuprofen and naproxen as well as herbal and nutraceutical products (fish oil, joint supplements).

Many of these products are tasty to pets, and some can be life threatening if ingested.

4. Household Products

There were nearly 17,000 calls to the APCC about household products in 2013. Household toxins can range from fire logs to cleaning products. Some items can be corrosive, while other can cause obstruction of the gastrointestinal tract requiring surgical intervention.

5. People Food

Human foods are especially appealing to pets, especially dogs. Dogs can get themselves into serious trouble by ingesting onions/garlic, grapes/raisins and xylitol, a sugar substitute which can be life-threatening for animals.

6. Veterinary Products and Medications

Veterinary products slid down two spots this year. Both OTC and prescription veterinary products are included in this group. Flavored tablets make it easy to give your pet pain or joint medication, but it also makes it more likely for them to ingest the entire bottle if given the chance.

7. Chocolate

Chocolate is still the number one people food that pets ingest (we received an average of 26 calls a day last year). Too



much chocolate can cause vomiting, diarrhea, high heart rate and seizures.

8. Rodenticides

When putting out baits to kill mice and rats, never underestimate the resourcefulness of your pet. Approximately 5.5 percent of calls to the APCC in 2013 were related to baits. Depending on the type of rodenticide, ingestion can cause internal bleeding, kidney failure or seizures.

9. Plants

More than 9,000 cases in 2013 were

pet parents calling about their animals eating plants. This is one category that cats lead dogs in the number of exposures. Lilies can cause



kidney failure and death in cats. Please see our list of toxic/non-toxic plants for more information.

10. Lawn and Garden Products

Fertilizers, which can be made of dried blood, poultry manure and bone meal, are very attractive to pets, so it is not surprising that we get many calls (over 5,000 in 2013) on lawn and garden items.

Seven Annoying Things You Should Expect When You Have a Cat

Pops for Pups

Your dog is going to love these! Whip up these frozen treats in mere minutes. It doesn't get any easier.

Cheese Please: Mix together equal parts cottage cheese, a bit of water and – if you're going the savory route, some peanut butter or leftover chicken beef or fish. Feeling sweet? Blend in some blueberries, strawberries or watermelon.

Chicken Soup on Ice: Had barbecued chicken for dinner? Don't chuck the carcass! Throw it in a large pot, cover with water and let simmer for an hour and a half. Cool, then pick the meat off, discarding the bone but keeping the cartilage, meat and broth. Leftover cooked carrots and/or peas? Mash them up and mix them in! Pour the chicken broth into your popsicle mold (save whatever's leftover as a tasty addition to your dogs next few meals) and freeze. Or go the quick and easy route:

freeze some store-bought broth. Just make sure it's low salt and contains no onion. Super Frozen Smoothies: Get out the blender and blend together 1/4 cup plain, natural yogurt, 1 ripe banana, 2 cups of your choice of unsweetened juice (orange juice, apple or pineapple) and a handful of blueberries. Also try peach, watermelon, strawberry or raspberry. This is a great one to share with your dog! Pour into molds or containers and freeze or enjoy as a drink – it's delicious either way. You can add a bit of honey or agave to your potion if you like sweeter.

Pumpkin Pops: Blend some canned, unsweetened pumpkin with plain, low fat yogurt and a bit of water then freeze for a cool, low calorie dog treat.

Cheeseburger Pops: Have some leftover cooked hamburger patties and cheese from your last cookout? Crumble up the burger and cheese, mix it with water or broth (low or no salt!), pour it into the container of your choice and pop it into the freezer!

Peanut Butter Pops: Simple mix together peanut

butter, mashed up banana (the perfect use for the too-ripe bananas sitting on your countertop) and water then freeze.

You can make pupsicles in an array of containers. For bigger dogs, use a popsicle mold or little Tupperware containers. For little dogs, and ice cube tray is perfect for making small-sized treats.

Want to make your dog work for it? Pour your popsicle ingredients of choice into a stuffable toy like a Kong, plug the end with peanut butter and

freeze for a hot weather treat your pup can play with! All these treats are best given outdoors to avoid a mess.



10 Strange Dog Behaviors Explained

Dogs MIGHT NOT SEEM AS MYSTERIOUS AS CATS, BUT CANINES do have their fair share of behaviors that are truly baffling. As humans, it's hard for us to make sense of many canine body language and social cues. A dog's desire to sniff butts, hump legs and chase his own tail just doesn't translate.

To help you better understand your dog's odd habits, we rounded up 10 dog behaviors that people commonly consider mysterious.

Chases Her Tail

If you had a tail, wouldn't you chase it? This is simply a fun way for your pup to expend her excess energy. But if she does this constantly, then she might have anal gland problems or flea allergy dermatitis. In some cases, tail chasing can be a sign of obsessive-compulsive disorder. If you can't distract your dog from chasing her tail or if you suspect she has a medical condition, you should speak to your veterinarian.

Licks You

While you might not always want your dog to cover you in slobbery kisses, his licks are actually his way of showing affection. Plus, your dog has probably figured out that licking you tends to get your attention.

Of course, there are other reasons dogs lick you. Some researchers say licking is a sensory tool for dogs – similar to reaching out and touching something. Another explanation could be that canine mothers lick their puppies (and puppies lick their mothers and littermates) for grooming and social reasons.

Eats Poop

This habit is just plain gross. Many things can cause coprophagy (the medical term for consuming feces). Your pup might be hungry. He could like the smell and taste. It's possible he's missing key nutrients from his diet. He might just think it's fun. It's not a behavior we want to dwell on, so for everyone's sake, we'll just say that if your dog is fond of eating you-know-what, ask your veterinarian for help.

Stares at You

Are your canine's eyes always trained on you? Chances are, he's hoping you'll give him a treat or shower him with praise and affection. After all, it's hard to resist those pleading, puppy-dog eyes. It's important to keep in mind that some dogs consider direct eye contact threatening. So before you gaze back at him, make sure he isn't showing any signs of aggression or fear.

Cocks Her Head

Whistling, speaking in a high-pitched voice or even making funny noises can cause one of dogdom's cutest and most amusing behaviors: head tilting. Exactly why dogs cock their heads to the side remains uncertain, but behaviorists speculate that canines are trying to make sense of what they hear. They also might be trying to pick out a key word like "walk" or "fetch" to find out if what you're saying will lead to something fun or rewarding. Another reason your pup might tilt her head is to more accurately determine the location of a sound.

If she's consistently holding her head to one side without an obvious trigger, she might have a medical issue and should see a veterinarian.

Howis

Wolves howl to send messages to pack members who might be far away. They also emit the loud, low-pitched sound to enforce rank. It makes sense out in the wild, but why do domesticated canines do it? It could just be a behavior passed on from their ancestral cousins, but behaviorists also think that howling is instinctively necessary and rewarding for dogs.

Humps You, Objects or Other Dogs

Humping – whether it's on other dogs, on your leg or on an object – is usually not for sexual reasons. And it's probably not an attempt to dominate. More likely, neutered and spayed dogs hump because they are excited or seeking attention. To prevent this embarrassing behavior, ignore it or try to redirect it with a treat or toy.

Walks in Circles Before Lying Down

Sometimes we just want to tell our dogs that no matter how many times they walk in a circle before lying down in their bed, it won't change their resting spot's level of comfort. You can blame your dog's ancestors for this curious ritual. Behaviorists believe that when wolf-like dogs lived in the wild, they would walk around a spot to pat down the leaves, grass or other debris to create a nice nesting spot.

Sniffs Other Dogs' Butts

A dog's way of saying, "Hello, nice to meet you," to another dog is to sniff the other dog's butt. In the human world, this behavior could land you in jail. In the dog world, this is a socially acceptable form of greeting. But still, why sniff butts? A dog's ability to smell is 10,000 times better than ours, and, well, there are a lot of revealing aromas that come from a canine's rear end.

Thrashes His Toys

Sophie sure looks like she's having fun when she vigorously shakes her stuffed squeaky duck. But the truth is, she's manifesting one her most primal instincts: killing. OK, we're being a little dramatic. Out in the wild, thrashing is how Sophie would kill her prey. At home, she's just exhibiting innocent play behavior.
