ZOILA (NOW MAYA)"Maya is fitting in perfectly with our family. Thank you so much for everything you do."




JOJO

The Health Benefits of Animal Ownership and Interaction

It's a fact: interacting with animals can be good for your health. Studies have shown that incorporating animal-assistance therapy into modern medicinal practices can have a positive effect on patient health and well-being.

In the right situation, animal therapy has the ability to provide pain relief, alleviate depression and anxiety, and improve overall mood and disposition.

THE HISTORY OF ANIMAL THERAPY

Utilizing animals to assist humans with differing diseases and afflictions is certainly nothing new. Records of pet therapy begin as early as the 19th century, when Florence Nightingale incorporated pet interaction while caring for wounded soldiers during the Crimean War. In 1919, dogs were allowed to accompany psychiatric patients at St. Elizabeths Hospital in Washington, DC. Since that inception, animals have been used in many different instances as adjunct therapy.

PROVIDING PAIN RELIEF

An increased pain threshold has been noted in patients after performing animal therapy due to the increased levels of oxytocin within the body. In patients with chronic pain, a decrease in pain perception along with several other positive effects was noted.

In studies conducted on pediatric patients aged between 3-17 years, pain reduction amongst patients utilizing animal therapy was four times greater than that of those who did not utilize animal therapy.

During research involving patients receiving hip replacements, not only was a lower overall pain level reported after each physical therapy session, but a

more rapid decrease in pain between therapy sessions was reported as well.

The dependence and abuse of pain medication is a big issue in our society. These medications often have other negative side effects such as drowsiness and nausea. Pet therapy can provide substantial lessening of pain, with minimal risks or side effects to the patient.

ALLEVIATION OF DEPRESSION AND ANXIETY

The increase in oxytocin due to a pleasant interaction with an animal results in an increase in social interaction and empathy. This in turn decreases aggression and depression. Oxytocin has also shown to be an anxiolytic, promoting a decrease in anxiety.

Chronic pain patients have shown a decrease in fatigue, stress, anxiety and sadness, along with an increase in cheerfulness.

IMPROVEMENT OF MOOD AND DISPOSITION

Research has shown a decrease in stress hormones as well as the activation of mirror neurons when confronted with a happy, pleasant animal. This prompts the display of a cheerful, pleasant disposition within subjects.

In a study on psychiatric patients with violent behavior tendencies, the use of an equine therapy interventional program resulted in a decrease in violent behavior episodes. Positive psychiatric symptoms such as selfesteem and self-determination have been noted among schizophrenic patients.

Chronic pain patients have shown a decrease in aggravation and irritability, along with an increase in calmness and pleasantness.

ADDITIONAL BENEFITS

There are so very many loving and affectionate animals out there that need a home or a purpose. By utilizing these animals in the ways stated, they get a second chance. An animal that may have spent an much of its life in a kennel is now able to be utilized to bring happiness and comfort to those who need it. In this respect, there is mutual benefit for both the owner and the dog.

Stop by your local animal shelter when you get a chance. You may find a companion that can change your life in more ways than you imagined. ••
